The Most Holy Trinity - Year A

7th June 2020

In Peter writes: The famous 20th century palaeontologist and writer, Fr Teilhard de Chardin, a sort of clerical and scholarly Indiana Jones, wrote that 'throughout my life, the world has little by little caught fire in my sight until, aflame around me, it has become almost completely luminous from within... Christ, his heart a fire, capable of penetrating everywhere, and gradually, spreading everywhere.' This quote helps open up the mystery of the Most Holy Trinity, the Church teaching on the life of God. Similar thoughts are expressed by Gerald Manley Hopkins the Jesuit poet who wrote, 'the world is charged with the grandeur of God, it will flame out like shinning from shook foil'. The Trinity speaks of the fire-like universal exuberance of God's goodness that radiates outwards from the historic person Jesus Christ and which, when God's purposes are fulfilled, will completely consume all reality

For many the teaching on the Trinity, celebrated in particular this Sunday, is something obscurantist and largely irrelevant but the Church's subtle teaching about the relationship of God to the world is the one of the highest points of human intellectual endeavour. The Trinity, of Father, Son and Holy Spirit, brings together the otherness of God and the materiality of our human condition, the infinite God and the particular person, you and me. The doctrine of the Trinity also safeguards the dignity of the human person, and thus is the supernatural bedrock for human rights, and the spiritual engine that helped give Christian civilisation its unique form. Today we live in the wreckage of that culture, with only fragments half remembered and contradictory inserts added. Thus, it is possible to clap for the NHS, for their efforts to nurse patients through Covid 19 and fail to see that the right to life applies to the unborn and the terminally ill as well. These and many other contradictions run through every person, like some local shop workers who insist on parking for free in the Church carpark who at same time would rightly look horrified should I walk out without paying.



Christian faith involves accepting what might seem at first sight contradictory,

our supernatural origin, our fragmentary human way of existence and supernatural power to share in the life of God. This vision is not simply dropped on us from some spiritual height but is discovered within ourselves, God is at work in these ways already in my life. Engaging with faith rather than toying with mere cultural inheritance begins when we discover the internal spiritual fire that makes us wish to overcome or at least come to terms with our weaknesses and create something with their lives. This is not understood in terms of career, financial success or material abundance, but in terms of love, not as a myth or fantasy, but as project of life. As always, this project has its ups and downs, its moments of bliss and moments of anxiety, loneliness and sadness.

Teilhard de Chardin speaks of the world catching fire, but that world is our collective world of which our individual worlds are but just a part. Our worlds catch fire when we allow the Holy Spirit into our lives because the Holy Spirit makes present and powerful the person of Jesus with his healing and forgiving presence. The Holy Spirit makes Jesus present here and now in my life today, the friendship between ourselves and Jesus is the Holy Spirit. We do not normally describe love as a person nor do we describe friendship as a person but everyone experiences without reflection that love and friendship are something, worth nurturing and, sustaining. The radical Christian proposal is that love and friendship is not something but ultimately someone. When we think this way it becomes easier to see what a precious gifts love and friendships can become, and all the attendant dangers when we starting thinking otherwise.

The explanation of God as Trinity is not therefore a matter for theological boffins alone but touches the deepest parts of our daily lives and both purifies and divinely adds to the fire of life that exists inside each of us.
