THE BAPTISM OF THE LORD - 9 JANUARY 2022 Year C

In Peter writes: looking forward to some

Most of us, I am sure, are looking forward to some return to pre-January 2020 normality, of being

able to meet, socialise and travel without numerous rules about masks, testing and isolating. For now, the return to normality still looks just over the horizon, and so the present moment might be the time to reflect on just what sort of 'normality' I would wish to return. Changes in lifestyle are popular pre-occupations around New Year, but for the Christian this pre-occupation should be of lifelong concern.

What makes the Christian pre-occupation in changing lifestyle may be described broadly as the move from selfishness to solidarity. Thinkers describe how philosophy changed in the 17th century from concern with the whole of creation and with the human person as the microcosm of the whole, to the exclusive concerns about the individual standing over and against the world. This seemly abstruse change in perspective might sound meaningless. Yet each of us lives this reality every day and this change explains the antagonism experienced and offered by ourselves in daily life. Are we solitary individuals trying to get on together or are we already in relation with each other and trying to learn how to behave appropriately?

Turning inwards and becoming the individual of modern culture will always entail that community and solidarity never really come naturally. Solidarity in this setting can only ever become enlightened self-interest, whether for the family, community or nation. A famous 19th century thinker Max Weber thought that the expansion of capitalism and the emergence of Protestantism went hand in hand. Anglo-Saxon countries. With their sense of individuality these nations marching ahead in the Industrial Revolution compared to Catholic Europe more concerned with living in relationship, emphasising the wider family and for Weber the baleful effect of the Catholic Church. There is something in this theory but such sweeping explanations never reveal the richness and depth of human experience.

The solitary individual looking into himself or herself cannot discover the peace desired by himself and the remedies, often provided, whether psychological or therapeutic, are sadly predicated on the same erroneous foundations. The secular solitary individual is a child of the Reformation rather than the product of Catholic tradition. What makes the difference between the two denominations is not the unique role of Jesus Christ as Our Saviour, but how Jesus Christ relates to each of us through His humanity. Jesus Christ is a person in relation, to his mother, the Virgin Mary, the Holy Family, His larger group of relations. Later this same style of relationship will inform the foundation of the Church, not a community of bloodline, but of the Holy Spirit

who creates and sustains the community.

Protestantism sees salvation through Jesus Christ alone, and the Church, in their eyes, does not possess much of a role, other than being the community where a group of like-minded individuals can worship together. Catholic believe that the Church has an essential role because it mirrors our own natural relationships and responds to our and need to share life with others in some form of community.

This Sunday the Church celebrates the Baptism of the Lord, the event when Jesus submits to the penitential baptism of John the Baptist. Jesus does not require such a baptism as being born without sin, but does so both to validate John's mission but also to line up in solidarity with those seeking reconciliation. Over the last two weeks the Church has celebrated Christmas, the birth of the Saviour, the night of pure joy infused with all the hope that the birth of a child brings; Epiphany when the three wise men recognise their journey to the infant king ends in adoration. Now, thirty

years later, the Church celebrates another beginning, that of His public life. Today we glimpse how that public life will be conducted, in solidarity with sinful and put-upon humanity. Jesus is in solidarity through His humanity, and through His divinity, expressed through His mission to forgive sins, bring healing, and the sacramental means to achieve closer union with God, the source of all life. This Sunday's Gospel demonstrates that the joy of Christmas night has not disappeared but is being offered here and now by one like us, at our level, not casting judgement but offering hope for spiritual and moral transformation in this life. None of this would be possible if Jesus Christ was not in relationship and solidarity with us.




Guidelines to follow when at Mass
