Fr Peter writes:

The sad news of the death of a former reality TV presenter last week is just another step in the decline of our culture and the moral confusion that such actions generate. Promoted beyond her mental resilience by an industry unable to give due weight to the collateral damage that instant fame bring;, remembered by the tweetings and Instagram pictures of vacuous friends lauding the achievements and their friendship of the recently deceased seemingly oblivious to what had happened; and the sustaining of a blame game as to who should take responsibility, the viewer, the reader, the director, the production company or the individual themselves. This case and others like it demonstrate the dangerous combination of lack of education, instant fame, the vicissitudes of the public seeking ever new thrills and the media chasing ever new sources of profit. These moments demonstrate the dark side of contemporary culture where the moral anchors have been lost both corporately and individually. Profit and culture are not mutually exclusive pursuits as the popularity of West End musicals demonstrate but recognition should be made of the darker side where profit link-up with the baser demands of sinful humanity.

This is both a moral tale for today and the place where the light of the Gospel potentially could bring both sanity and forgiveness. Most drug addicts begin their path of decline by claiming to themselves that they are strong enough to take it and will not let the drug master them. More often than not this is an idle boast. Dependency comes quickly that leads the addict into an ever-increasing spiral of decline. That same spiral is always found when something becomes addictive, whether alcohol, pornography, or pornography-lite, too much of modern television.

The search for perfection, the content of the last two Sunday's Gospels concludes with the need to demonstrate forgiveness in front of one's enemies. One might ask who are these enemies? Are they just the obvious, the physical bully in the school playground, the psychological bully in the office, or the verbal bully at the school gate? There is also a much more subtle enemy that permeates the structures of our mind and heart, that can often, without our conscious consent, dictate what we find humorous and entertaining. Alternative comedians think swear words are a form of entertainment as do the gullible sitting in the audience. They, like us, might never have examined the spiritual sources of

humour and entertainment.

One source of humour is the feeling of getting someone back for the sleights and pain caused by others. If I have suffered such misfortune, I will seek to find someone else to off-load my anger and shame. Laurel and Hardy made this an artform but their self-inflicted misfortunes, ones that we have all shared, were harmless compared to the misfortunes of the individuals voted out of tv competitions. The desire to get back at others is rooted in the inability to forgive or less pass. The emotional pain festers and naturally we wish to pass that pain on to someone else. It becomes easy to pour our scorn on some inadequate who has been voted out of the house, the island etc. The drive is our own failures in love, not the inherent worth of the project to find the best. The brutal society that was the Roman Empire found its mirror in the Games. The same dynamic holds for modern secular society.

Jesus concludes the Counsels of Perfection with the command to forgive because it breaks the cycle of imitative violence. To break the cycle is to begin to live in spiritual peace because the instinctual drive to get one's own back is mitigated by the more original plan of God to live in harmony with Him and each other. The conclusion of this section of the Sermon on the Mount recognises that the world is ambiguous as God causes His rain to fall on just and unjust alike. Yet the call to perfection remains and that is why the cycle of forgiveness is a necessary part of the life of faith. The divine gift of forgiveness cuts away gradually at the malignant power that animates contemporary culture of getting our own back, and of finding a victim to mitigate our unexpressed anger. Maybe this Lent is an opportunity to reflect on the spiritual source of our own culture as expressed in our TV habits, our driving habits and our speech in the company of others.

May I update the Parish on the status of the appeal with regard to the refurbishment of the Hall, facilities and basement. Thank to everyone who has contributed so far and I am very pleased to say that the total donated or pledged is now

£80,600

The appeal total is £100,000, of which we have now raised just over 80% which is a great achievement in the time. If you would like to contribute to the appeal and help the Parish to achieve this target please do so. The Church has always been a mass donor society, and every parish relies on the contributions of parishioners for its continued existence. The cost of refurbishing the hall and facilities is being mitigated by the future rents from the Hall which have been bundled together to create a Diocesan loan to the Parish. Lenten Project 2020

We are pleased to announce that the two charities that will be the recipients of this year's Lenten Project monies are:

Medical Missionaries of Mary Trust - The money we raise for the Medical Missionaries of Mary will fund much needed equipment for the St Kizito Health Centre, a clinic opened by the MMM in 2016 in a slum area of Lilongwe, the capital of Malawi. This includes a microscope slide drier (used in the diagnosis of malaria), a Hemocue machine for the diagnosis of anaemia (especially useful for pregnant women) and an autoclave for sterilising instruments for basic surgical procedures. Any extra money we raise would be used to fund treatment for the very poorest patients, who can't afford to pay for their own treatment.

ZANE—Zimbabwe, A National Emergency

We support the education of 84 children from destitute families in pop-up classes. Part of the expense of these classes is the provision of a hot meal each day to the children. ZANE comment that this food has made an incredible difference; the children are looking noticeably healthier and are far better able to concentrate. ZANE also support with a weekly food pack for 14 of the poorest families of those attending.

Weekly envelopes for Lenten Alms will be available from the start of Lent.
